William Mullins

William Mullins (c.1572 – 1621). He was a signatory to the Mayflower Compact. Mullins perished in the first winter in the New World, with his wife and son dying soon after.

William Mullins was born about 1572 in Dorking, Surrey, England located about 21 miles south of London.

The first mention of William Mullins in Dorking records was on October 4, 1595, when he was fined, at about age 23, two pence by the manorial court for non-attendance at that year's session. That record states that he was then residing in the Chippingborough district of Dorking. Records note a William Mullins named on a 1596 muster list for Stoke, near Guildford, co. Surrey, where it is believed he was living at that time, and returning to Dorking about 1604.

There are records of a baptism recorded at Holy Trinity Church, Guildford on December 11, 1598 for a daughter named Elizabeth may have been deceased as a child. On December 28, 1612 – Mullins purchased a tenement on West Street in Dorking. This house still exists and is often a stopping place for tourists. Banks refers to this house as the “Manor of Dorking”. This house still exist and is featured on the cover of this Summer Edition 2016. It appears he made a good living as a shoemaker as his was one of the larger investments in the Merchant Adventurers group, of which he was a member, which was investing in the Pilgrim venture. His will shows he had nine shares of stock in the Merchant Adventurers and that his estate consisted primarily of boots and shoes.

William Mullins died on February 21, 1621, coincidentally the same date as another *Mayflower* passenger, William White, whose wife Susannah did survive. William was buried in Coles Hill Burial Ground, Plymouth, probably in an unmarked grave as was common in those early days. His wife Alice and son Joseph died sometime later in 1621 and were also buried in Coles Hill Burial Ground. The family is memorialized on the Pilgrim Memorial Tomb, Coles Hill, as “William Mullins, Alice his wife and Joseph their son.”

He was survived by his daughter Priscilla Mullins (Alden) who married John Alden. Priscilla was most likely born in Dorking in Surrey. She was just eighteen when she boarded the *Mayflower*. She lost her parents and her brother Joseph during the first winter in Plymouth. She was then the only one of her family in the New World, although she had another brother and a sister who remained in England. Priscilla & John are recorded to have more descendants than any of the other *Mayflower* passengers.

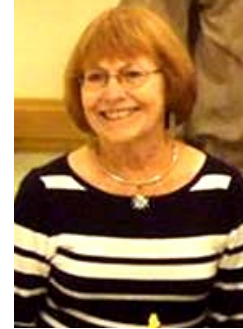

Junior Membership

I became the Junior Membership Secretary in June 2015. Among my first steps was updating the membership roster. Jane Clayson, my predecessor, did a good job, but among things the roster was not fully computerized. Now it is. I also included the records of Pat Stanford which was in less organized condition, but some of the juniors enrolled in her time have birthdates of 1997 or later, so they are still juniors too.

Currently the list shows 387 junior members but this is probably not correct. The Pat Stanford list only had year of birth, so some of the young people have certainly aged out.

I opened a PO Box and designed stationary. The P.O. Box address is P.O. Box 1245, Monrovia, California 91017.

I have given some thought as to why there is a junior program. It seems to me the key points are encouraging our juniors to appreciate their heritage and encouraging them to become members when they become adults.

To the end of encouraging membership I have drafted a letter to go to juniors as they turn 18 , which has been worked on by Linda Longley and approved by Pat Friesen. I will start sending out these letters in the near future.

As to honoring their heritage, I would like to create a Kids Page on our website, ala what the Pennsylvania Society has done. (Sail 1620) There is actually already a General Society Junior Facebook group which a junior can join, although it is also oriented towards the State Junior Chairs. Our Junior and potential Junior Members can request to join the page, and it is full of interesting Mayflower material. The page is called GSMD Jr Mayflower Descendants. Colony Governors: please encourage your young people to join the group.

My predecessors spent a lot of energy developing activities for the juniors but it is hard to find one that fits all of them. We have an enormous state with a population twice the size of Canada, and a constituency which ranges from newborn to 17 years plus. (Canada doesn't do junior membership.) We also lose track of members, when they move. It seems to me a webpage is most likely to reach and interest juniors.

So I remind you to tell the members of your colonies that it is easy for a member to enroll a family member under 18 as a Junior Member. No additional documentation is required and the fee is only \$25. Visit our state website for the application.

Major Changes in the 2017-2018 Scholarship Program

Beginning in 2017-18, the California Mayflower Society will offer three significantly increased scholarships each year--\$5000, \$3000 and \$2000. This is by far the largest scholarship funding by a state society. Special thanks to the Board of Assistants for making this commitment. I encourage all members of the Society to include a contribution to the scholarship fund in your annual payment of society dues; your contributions help make these awards possible.

I have worked with the Scholarship Committee—Robert Dempster (Rancho Conejo Colony Governor), Nancy Foley (San Francisco Peninsula Colony Deputy Governor) and Kathy Gire (Mother Lode Colony Governor)—to make the scholarship requirements more meaningful for our applicants and to provide more useful information about them.

Our essay now requires applicants to demonstrate knowledge of Mayflower history by linking them to their Mayflower ancestor while giving them the opportunity to be creative. Here is our new essay prompt.

Ships visiting Plymouth Colony gave the Pilgrims the opportunity to write letters to their families in England and Holland.

Compose an essay, between 750 and 1,000 words, in the form of a letter to the family of your Mayflower ancestor back in England or Holland describing the impact the Mayflower Compact had on the early life of Plymouth Colony. Your essay must include references to document the facts in the essay. Sources must be cited in appropriate bibliographic style.

We also require some additional information and documents--GPA, class rank, ACT or SAT scores, an academic recommendation letter and a character reference letter--required for the GSMD national scholarships and for many of the state scholarships.

All information and material needed to apply for our scholarships is now available for download on the Scholarship page of the California Mayflower Society website. Note that junior members of the California Society or children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews and great grandnieces and great grandnephews of Society members are eligible to receive scholarships, regardless of their state of residence. With the significant increase in award amounts, I am hoping for a significant increase in applications this year.

Some Thought on Mayflower Education in Today's World

A vast increase in both breadth and depth of Mayflower resources available online and the emergence of a ubiquitous search engine (Google) have profoundly affected our society's role as purveyors of Mayflower information. The GSMD website and our state website have become increasingly important as a source of links to reliable Mayflower information.

In the past, our Society provided Mayflower books, articles, pamphlets, teacher plans and pictures directly to newspapers, teachers and the general public. Today, providing information to newspapers has shifted to the Internet. For teachers, both the GSMD Education Committee and the GSMD Junior Committee webpages have well-chosen links to curriculum materials. Googling Mayflowerhistory.com takes you to Caleb Johnson's exceptional and expertly organized source of Mayflower information and resources both print and online.

For our members, the Education Committee of the GSMD now has a page on the national website which features an online magazine, the Mayflower Education Gazette, with information about possible Mayflower clothing projects suitable for local colony Mayflower celebrations and articles from state societies describing possible state and colony activities. Five issues are now available to read online or download. I strongly urge every member to register on the GSMD website; there is a link on the home page. Registering gives you access to the resources provided by both the Education and the Junior Committees—just click on the Committees link under Members Only for links to the committee webpages; and you can read the new Mayflower Journal online free.

Making sure links on our website are current, accurate and clearly organized has become an important task. I have updated education-related links on our website and have added some additional links; this process will continue in the coming months. Special thanks to webmaster Mary Mitchell for her invaluable help and advice as we work to make access to accurate Mayflower information easily available.

Investments

Today the majority of US voters disapprove of both prospective presidential candidates. Investors seem to dislike all of their choices too, be it bonds, cash, or equities. Our investment firm, UBS, has hosted a summit for the past five years, which brings together global fund managers representing over 10 trillion US dollars of assets. Our Advisor reports that never has there been such a lack of conviction about markets or such a divergence of views about which asset classes will perform well or badly. Political events will continue driving uncertainty and volatility for the foreseeable future. Following the market's strong recovery since mid-February, global equity prices have given back a little over the past month. Still, our outlook for risk assets remains conservative. Global growth is holding up at a moderate level, and central banks remain very accommodative. The recent re-pricing of future US rate hikes has not caused a significant market drawdown. The growth/inflation mix remains positive – a fact that's also supported by our models. We expect the Fed to tread cautiously and tighten policy only gradually. The drag on global growth, stemming from investment cuts in commodity and manufacturing sectors, is abating. China, while still vulnerable to setbacks, has stabilized its economy, and currency outflows have slowed. Policymakers' willingness to prevent a significant economic cooling has given us confidence in maintaining a moderate risk stance, expressed in tactical overweight positions in US equities and corporate credit.

The resilient US economic expansion, an expected rebound in corporate profits, and only gradual Fed rate increases should drive further gains in US stocks. While manufacturing activity will likely remain muted until oil and gas investment spending stabilizes, fundamentals in the consumer segment are more encouraging. Household balance sheets are in good shape, debt service payments as a percentage of income are near all-time lows, labor markets remain strong, and there is pent-up demand for housing. GDP growth should firm as the year progresses.

This month, we are increasing our weighting in healthcare and reducing utilities. Healthcare stocks have continued to underperform due to concerns about greater regulatory oversight of drug prices, an outcome viewed as unlikely. With fundamentals intact and a tailwind from a weaker dollar, the sector becomes attractive. Higher-yielding utilities look more vulnerable than consumer staples if interest rates rise, as we expect. However, both sectors still look expensive. Our California Mayflower account is up 4.48% year to date versus the S&P which is up 3.57%. Our poorest performing stocks were Vertex Pharm, Gilead, Bristol Myers, Boeing, Nordstrom and Bank of America. Our best performing were 3M, AT&T, Con Edison, Dominion, Edison, Exxon, Facebook and PPL.

Given that we have recovered from the February lows, and uncertainty surrounding the election, it makes sense to raise a little cash. As you can see from the Equity Sector Report, our portfolio is overweight Utilities and Consumer Staples. In a recent discussion with our Investment Manager, we agreed to trim Edison, Dominion, PepsiCo, PPL and Proctor and Gamble down to \$50,000 each, raising cash of \$130,000. We will sit on the cash for now. Our Advisor recommends that the next sector we should target if we get a pullback would be technology as we are underweight in that sector. Included with this report are the Equity Sector Report and the Security Performance Report, both as of May 31, 2016. The Equity Sector and the Security Performance Reports are attached.

Wearing Your Mayflower Ribbons

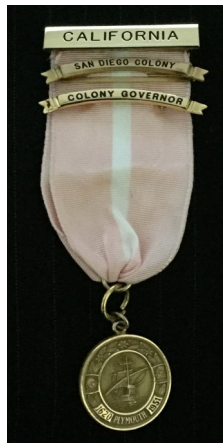
The State and Colony Officer Medal has a square top bar engraved with the officer's state attached to a ribbon above the state officer medal. The front of the medal displays "1620" on bottom left of medal and your state charter year on bottom right of medal. The state officer medal should only display state or colony officer title bars on the ribbon. The state offices displayed first, then the colony name bar then the colony offices held. The State Governor usually wears a neck medallion.

Eligibility: State and Colony Officers.

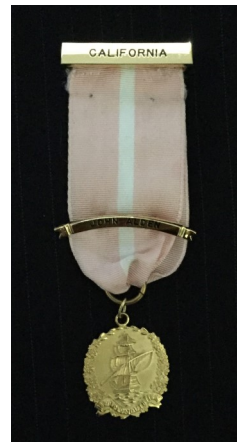
Insignia Protocol: Worn at state and colony meetings only

Members Medal

The Member Medal has a square top bar engraved with the member's state that is affixed to a ribbon above the member medal and is worn over the heart. Only the curved ancestor bars should be affixed to the GSMD Member medal.

Eligibility: GSMD members.

Insignia Protocol: Worn at society functions only.

The National GSMD Medal has a square top bar affixed to a ribbon above the GSMD medal. It should be worn over the heart alongside the State Officer Medal and Member Medal. Only national office and committee bars should be displayed on the ribbon.

Eligibility: National Officers including Deputy Governors General, Assistants General and those appointed to National GSMD Committees.

Insignia Protocol: Worn at society functions only.

The Miniature Member Medal is worn along with other genealogical medals across the heart.

Choose from Gold Filled (no stone), Gold Filled with 2mm pink zircon, Gold Filled with 2mm cubic zirconia or Gold Filled with .03 carat diamond.

Eligibility: GSMD members.

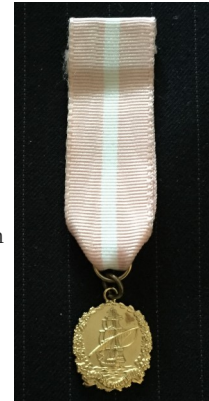
Insignia Protocol: May be worn at any genealogical function.

All of these ribbons are to be worn by members only and only at meetings (except miniature as mentioned). The officer ribbon with the highest office held should be on the left as viewed by another person. In the middle would be the state officer medal and to the right, the membership ribbon. Whether wearing one, two, or three official medals, all should be in a straight row and balanced over the heart.

Curved bars are not interchangeable between ribbons and should not be worn with the miniature or junior medal.

The **Junior Member Medal** can also be given to GSMD member's children. Eligibility: Lineage relatives of GSMD members who have joined their respective partner societies as junior members.

Insignia Protocol: Worn at society functions only. May be worn until age 25.

There are also unofficial ribbons with other Mayflower pins that may be worn on your right side. Both ladies and gentlemen may wear the society Rosette, recognition pin, charms, ties scarves. All of these items may be worn in public or at a meeting. All of the medals, jewelry, and other membership items may be purchased on the GSMD website on the Shop page.

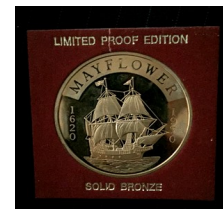

The 285 foot boat was built in Scotland and Stockton, California, as was her sister ship, *The Delta Queen*. The boats were christened in May of 1927 and began making daily trips from Sacramento to San Francisco in June of that year. The trip took ten and a half hours, and passage and food in a room cost \$3.50, but passengers could also ride for fifty cents on the cargo floor if they brought their own bedrolls.

The building of the big bridges killed river traffic, and both boats were painted gray and turned into Navy boats in World War II. They went on to have more colorful jobs after that, and the Coyne family bought the *King* and they spent five years refurbishing it. The family runs the operations on the boat, with Michael serving as General Manager. We are proud to have such a colorful history as a permanent attraction in Sacramento.

Mother Lode is proud to announce that Jeffrey Record, who is a member and serves as our Elder, has signed a contract along with Christopher C. Child for the use of their article "William and Lydia (Swift) Young of Windham, Connecticut: A John Howland and Richard Warren line." The article is scheduled to be published in the summer 2016 issue of *Mayflower Descendant* now published by the New England Historic and Genealogical Society. NEHGS retains the copyright to *Mayflower Descendant*, but the author can use the information as he chooses for other journals, magazines or personal websites. Southern California's Centennial Mayflower Celebration

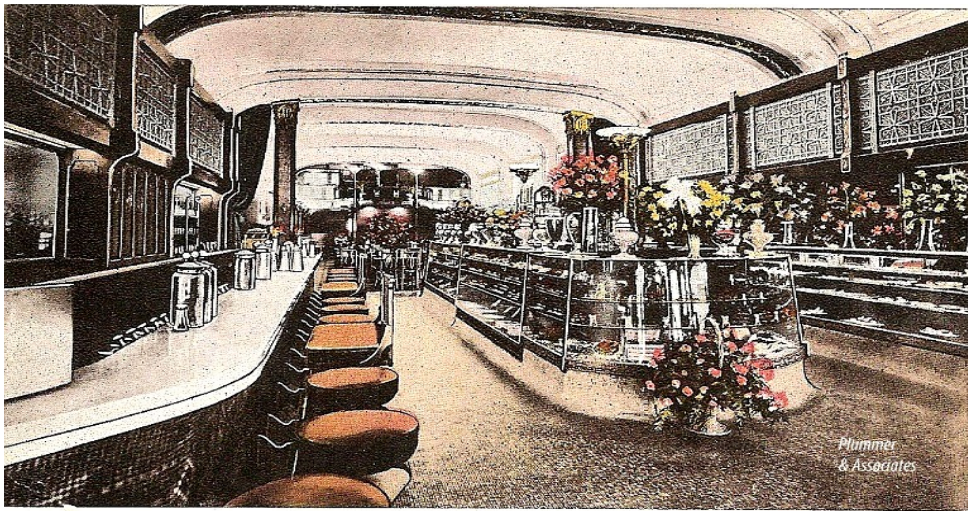

This year the Los Angeles Colony of Mayflower Descendants in the State of California is celebrating the 100th anniversary of its founding by Col. Holdridge Ozro Collins California #71. Col Collins was made a member of the California Mayflower Board of Assistants on August 19th 1915. Col Collins started the Society of Colonial Wars in Los Angeles in 1895, and became their first Governor. He also started The Sons of the Revolution in Los Angeles and became their first Governor in 1896.

Although there had been many Mayflower celebrations in Southern California previous to November 25th 1916. This was the first one for the Mayflower Society. It occurred at the luxurious Christopher's Confectionary and Café at 741 South Broadway. The building's grand opening the year before was a highly celebrated event in Los Angeles featuring three dining rooms, a banquet room, and one of the West Coasts first Soda Fountains. Christopher had five elegant Sweet shops that were a major attraction in Los Angeles. It is interesting to note that I have a Candy box with the Christophers logo on it that is exactly like a See's Candy box sold today.

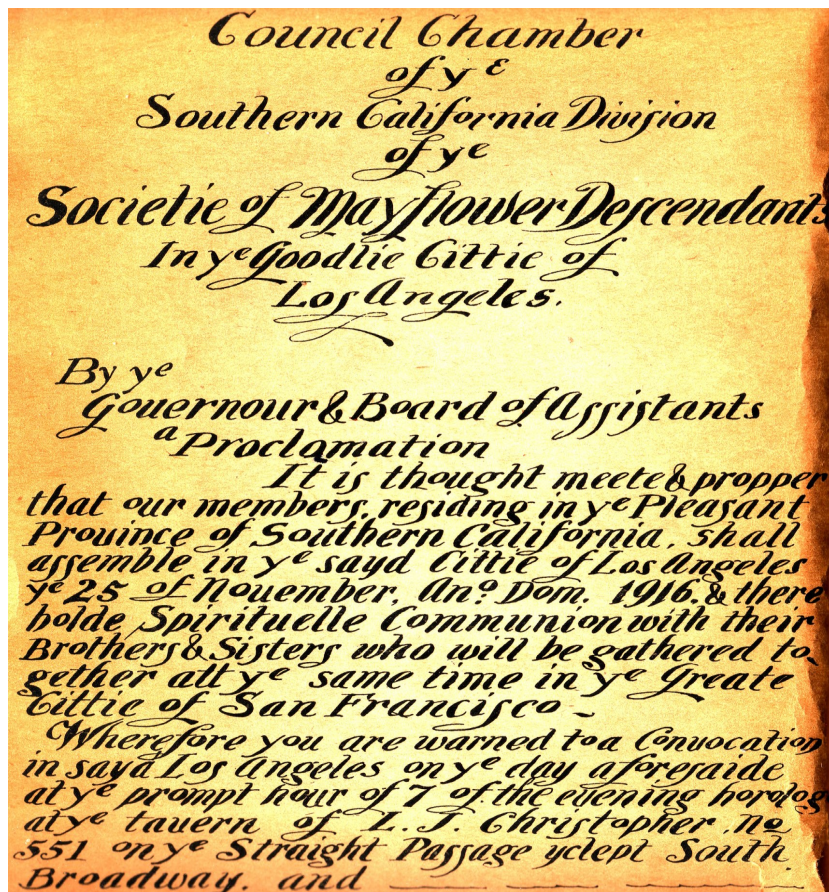


Christopher's Main Store, 741 So. Broadway, Los Angeles.

The invitation was in old English, and preceded by a page of Shakespearean poetry with a culinary theme by the Honorable Frank Thomas Woodman, Mayor of Los Angeles. The event was recorded and compiled into a small book by Col Collin's daughter Rejoyce Collins Booth. The LA Times announced the event and the LA Herald and LA Examiner reported the event.

Speakers included Col. Collins, Hon Grant Jackson Superior Court Judge, Mr. Frank Hervey Pettingell President of the Los Angeles Stock Exchange, General Clarke Prescott, Speaker of the State Legislature.
