

Another highlight of the 41st Congress was attending the services at the historic First Parish Church where the announcement was made of the agreement for GSMD to take custody of the church for a three year period that would become permanent if

GSMD can raise an endowment of Three Million Dollars by Congress in 2020. The CA Society pledged \$10,000.00 to such effort. The GSMD 2020 Committee distributed copies of a letter for signature to be sent to the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee requesting the US Postal Service mark the 400th Anniversary of the Voyage of the *Mayflower* with a commemorative stamp to be issued in 2020.

I look forward to attending the Board of Assistants meeting and the new CA Mayflower Society Library open house this month in Oakland.

Secretary Data Processing South

If you are a Yahoo (Verizon) user there is a bit of sad news if you haven't already read about it. In 2013 it was hacked and is now estimated to be the largest breach of data ever reported affecting three billion accounts. It is attributed to greater use of online storage AKA the cloud. "So far this year, hacks have made up more than half of the reported data breaches, more than any year in the past decade" CNBC News. Attackers accessed email addresses, passwords, birth dates, and personal information. There are 41 consumer class-action lawsuits in the U.S. and still rising according to Reuters. You should change your passwords from time to time, but if you store your data on the cloud there is no guaranty it will be safe. It would even be a good idea to back up your banking data on your own external hard drive.

As many of you know, last year Governor Marcia Maloney and I engaged in a project to donate updated Silver Books to the genealogy library of the Southern California Genealogy Society. We personally inventoried their holdings to determine what was lacking, then arranged for a donation of the updated volumes. It was a very successful project, we got some publicity at the Society and at Jamboree we could tell prospective members where to find current Silver Books. Thanks also to Treasurer David Grinnell who has done the ordering and made sure the various financial ducks were properly aligned.

As a result I am now continuing the project. This year we made a donation of two updated Silver Books to the Carlsbad City library's genealogical library, and Deputy Governor North Sally Johnson and I visited the Sutro genealogical library, a part of the California State library, in San Francisco in August and have now started the process to donate a number of Silver Books to update their collection. In both these libraries, even though they were genealogical libraries, the librarians did not know what the Silver Books were.

Last year I did a 20 minute PowerPoint talk called "Why the Mayflower Matters" for my Rotary Club. It went over very well, so I have contacted several other Rotary Clubs in the area to offer the program and have had interest, although nothing booked yet. I know I am not the only Mayflower member who is also a Rotarian and gives talks, but if you are not familiar with Rotary, it is a fantastic service club. The clubs mostly meet once a week and they need speakers every week, so it is a nice opportunity to tell our story. I can let you have my PowerPoint if you wish. I am also booked to talk about the Mayflower at a couple of genealogical societies. Again many of us do these talks, and I thank you all. And don't forget, you might want to contact an elementary school in your area to donate children's books and do a presentation.

Finally I am so excited by the GSMD collaboration with the New England Historical Genealogical Society and FamilySearch to get our fifth generation of the Silver Books and older membership applications accessible and indexed online. This should be sure to be a boost to Membership Chair Scott Miller's Find the Pilgrim in You project, and we have started planning how to promote this new tool.

2020 Committee Report

The California 2020 Committee, held a short meeting after the regular board meeting of the Orange County board. Our primary mission was to develop a plan to cover the Mayflower oriented Float in the 2020 Rose Parade in Pasadena on January 1, 2020. At the most recent congress in Plymouth, Gov. Maloney reported there was considerable National interest in the project. It was agreed, that California Mayflower would be assuming leadership on this project, in the name of the General Society. We were pleased to have advice on this matter from Carole Curran, an honorary director of the Tournament of Roses. We have filed an application for a float with the Tournament. We have been advised that for consideration by the Tournament, there must be universal consent within the Mayflower Society, internal conflict on this subject would be detrimental to our success. Further, the Tournament is very partial to sponsorships by national organizations, especially those with some international membership. We feel strongly, that Mayflower has a very good opportunity to win one of the few open invitations for sponsorship of a float.

There was considerable discussion on how to finance sponsorship, with a wide number of ideas on fund raising, leading to the conclusion that there are no barriers to success.

While we have 13 colonies in California, we have only heard of active 2020 programs from San Diego. We encourage every colony to create a 2020 committee, and establish ways to observe the 400th anniversary in your area. Please contact me if you are looking for some ideas. I will be distributing some thoughts on this subject in the coming weeks.

While researching his line he learned that Samuel2, was one of the first to leave Plymouth Colony and settled in Piscataway, New Jersey. New England before the sailing of the Mayflower

I admit that despite many clues I never thought much until recently about what role Europeans played in New England before the Pilgrims arrived on the Mayflower in 1620. All I knew was that their native friend, Squanto, greeted them in English, having been kidnapped and carried off to Europe years earlier. Tragically, when he returned, everyone in his village had died of a European disease. Where his village once stood was now the colony of Plymouth Plantation. We also know



that our ancestors agreed to the Mayflower Compact, signed in 1620 off Cape Cod, because they somehow missed arriving in "Northern Virginia" which was the area of their land patent.

So when did Europeans first reach New England? Where did the name New England come from? How about Cape Cod? How about Plymouth? And was there competition? The answers to these questions actually lie in

Jamestown, the first English language colony to survive, founded in 1607.

The key founder of Jamestown was an Englishman called Captain Bartholomew Gosnold, born in 1571. He pursued a seafaring life. Before Jamestown, in 1602 he attempted to found a colony in "northern Virginia" in what is now New England. He made it to the area and named the peninsula he reached, Cape Cod because well there was a lot of cod. He named an island there for his dead daughter, Martha's Vineyard. On another island off the cape, now called Cuttyhunk Island, he and his people built a fort, but after a month they abandoned the colony.

The English by this point were quite keen to colonize in North America and as a result two rival joint stock companies were chartered, the Virginia Company of London, based on where its organizers lived which had jurisdiction in what is now the American South up to what is now New York, and the Plymouth Company, based on where its organizers lived, which had jurisdiction in what is essentially now New England.

In Dec 1606, Gosnold managed to pull together enough backing via the London Company, which he helped found, for another try and this time set out for what would be the Jamestown Colony. He died there in August 1607. In 2003, what was probably his long-forgotten grave in Jamestown was discovered by archeologists. There was another try at establishing a colony in Maine, the "Popham colony" in 1607, the same time as Jamestown. The Popham Colony was sponsored by the rival Plymouth Company, organized by John Popham and Ferdinando Gorges, and led by George Popham. Both John and George Popham died the first winter and a year later the colony was abandoned.

In 1609 Captain John Smith who had been the president of the governing council of Jamestown colony left Jamestown after injuries and in disgrace. But in 1614 he set sail again for the New World, with two ships, this time to Maine and Massachusetts. After his departure, some of his company took native people as captives including Squanto. (There is uncertainty as to whether this was the second time Squanto was taken captive. He may originally have been taken captive in 1605 by an agent of Ferdinando Gorges.)

In 1616 in England Smith published a book called "A Description of New England." It is believed that this was the first time the name of New England was used for the area. Smith included the map shown here and gave place names to various locations along the coast

of Massachusetts including New Plimouth near Cape Cod. It was not his original choice of names for the coastline, but actually proposed by the heir to the throne, Prince Charles to whom he showed a draft of his book.

Religious separatists in Leiden, the Netherlands, now known as the Pilgrims, must have poured over that book. It was they who chartered two ships including the Mayflower for their voyage to the New World. It is unclear where the diseas-

es that decimated the native people came from, but we know that in the years after the visit of John Smith and before the Pilgrims arrived a number of fishermen, French as well as English, frequented New Eng-

land's waters. Cod was a very valuable commodity.

In 1619 in London the Leiden separatists entered into a deal for a land patent with the London Company in the jurisdiction of the London Company, ie no further north than New York, as well as ships with the same company. When the Pilgrims started negotiations, they were soundly cheated by their original investors. To satisfy new backers, a consortium of London financiers known as the Merchant Adventurers, they had to include "strangers" as laborers among the passengers. Many of the passengers on the Mayflower were not separatists but instead strangers.

John Smith made several attempts to return to New England, all failures. He then offered his services to the Leiden separatists, but they turned him down. By accident or design, the Mayflower's arrival on Cape Cod was considerably outside the jurisdiction of the London Company and their patent. The following year in 1621 the Pilgrims obtained a new patent from the newly reorganized Plymouth Council for New England . One of the strangers was Stephen Hopkins, who came on the Mayflower with his second wife, some of his children, and two servants. Stephen was unique in that he was the only passenger who had ever been to the New World before. In 1609 he had come on the "third supply", then spent 9 months on Bermuda after a shipwreck of the lead ship, the Sea Venture, before the castaways built two smaller ships to get to Jamestown.

He then spent several years in Jamestown. A letter regarding "Eliezer Hopkins" arrived in Jamestown in 1614, probably bringing the news his first wife had died, and so he returned to England, Thus he is a qualifying ancestor for both the Jamestowne Society and the Mayflower Society.

And not to forget the Canadian connection: The English were not the only Europeans interested in the area. The French made several attempts to colonize in New England, mostly minor settlements for fishing and hunting as well. Their first real North American colony was established in 1604 at St. Croix, an island at the extreme northern edge of what is now Maine.

St. Croix failed due to disease and in 1605 the founders moved what remained of it to what became Port Royal Habitation in modern Nova Scotia. A second French attempt in New England was a Jesuit mission called Saint Sauveur founded in 1613, also in northern Maine. Two months later, forces launched out of Jamestown wiped out both Saint Sauveur and Port Royal in 1613. Thus Jamestown made New England safe for English Protestants. And so, in 1620 English Protestants, ie the Pilgrims, started successful colonization of New England.

Dear Sir or Madam:

In 2020 and 2021 the United States will commemorate some of the most iconic events that led to the formation of our country. The date 1620 is so well established in American culture that it is literally carved in stone at Plymouth Rock. I request that the US Postal Service mark the 400th anniversary of the voyage of the Mayflower with a Pilgrim -themed commemorative stamp to be issued in 2020.

The Pilgrims left England and the Netherlands in pursuit of better lives in the New World plus a degree of religious freedom unknown in England at that time. They established the first permanent colony in New England, and their founding document, today called The Mayflower Compact, established the principle of self-government without supervision from external authorities. After arriving, the group signed an agreement with their neighboring Native Americans, a peace that lasted for over fifty years. All of these were extraordinary events with significant impact on American culture, typically celebrated today at the Thanksgiving holiday. They clearly fulfill the eleven criteria established by the USPS for commemoration on U.S. stamps.

The stereotypical image of a Pilgrim includes black garments, conical wide-brimmed hats with buckles, wide belts, and funny black shoes. You may know that modern scholarship has shown that Pilgrim dress was much more colorful than his image would convey. The USPS introduction of thermochromatic ink on the recent solar eclipse stamp provides a wonderful model of a stamp that could be educational and eye-catching to consumers. Without warming, it would show the traditional "black and white" image of Pilgrim dress, but when it is warmed their true colors could show through. Although the CSAC does not direct the artwork for stamps, such a rendition will take months or years to develop. I therefore request that the CSAC approve a Pilgrim-themed stamp in 2017 to allow enough time to create a high-quality artistic final product.

The First Parish Church Plymouth, Massachusetts

Founded in 1620 by the Pilgrims in Plymouth, the First Parish Church is the oldest church congregation in the United States in continuous operation. It is located at the base of Burial

Hill on the town square off Leyden Street in Plymouth, Massachusetts.

The congregation was founded in the English community of Scrooby in 1606 by the Pilgrims, a group of Protestant Christians. After they emmigrated to North America in 1620, the Separatist congregation established a church in Plymouth which became a parish church of Massachusett's Congregationalist state church.

The congregation is currently affiliated with the Unitarian Universalist Association and has 64 members as of 2016. The current building was completed in 1899 and was listed on the National

Register of Historic Places in 2014. It has Tiffany stained glass windows illustrating the Pilgrim story. The sanctuary features carved quarter-sawn oak and is one of the finest examples of hammer beam construction in the United States.

The opening service of the 41st Congress of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants was held in this church on Sunday, September 10, 2017. It was during this service that it was

announced to those present, by a representative of the congregation, that the congregation had voted that morning to agree to sell the church building to the General Society of Mayflower Descendants due to the fact this small congregation can not afford to maintain the church.

Due to the historic nature of this church and its connection to all descendants of the Mayflower, the General Society



desires to purchase this building to preserve it, make it a venue for Mayflower activities like the Mayflower House, and allow the congregation to continue to hold services in it.

I am sure we will hear a lot more about this in the future, but the goal right now is to raise the 3 million dollars by Congress of 2020, at which time the church would be deeded to the General Society.

Governor General's 1620 Club Tour

Members of the 1620 Club were invited to attend an historic tour on September 13, the day after Congress closed. Our first stop was in Duxbury, MA at the Myles Standish Burial Ground, America's oldest cemetery. Although the cemetery has gone through periods of neglect, it is now well



maintained, sitting on its one and one-half acres plot on the corner of Chestnut Street and Pilgrim By Way, Duxbury, Massachusetts. The Myles Standish grave marker stands in the center of the Standish family plot surrounded by 19th century canons purchased from the Boston Navy Yard. Stones were placed by the Alden Kindred of America in 1930 to mark the approximate location of John and Priscilla Alden's graves.

The tour then moved on to the Alden House Historic Site. The Alden Kindred of America has maintained the Alden House and the property upon which it rests are part of the original land grant given to John and Priscilla Alden in 1627. It was designated a National Historic Landmark



in 2009. The first house built on this site, about 760 feet southeast of the Alden House Historic Site, was professionally excavated and documented by historical archaeologist, Roland Wells Robbins in 1960. The original house had a foundation of 10 ½ feet by 38 feet. Many bricks and fragments of brick were found in the area, but no indication of a chimney base was found.



After lunch on the Alden House property, the group moved on to the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds. We had a very informative tour of the Registry of Deeds. Registrar, John R. Buckley, Jr. Esq. reported the following on their website. "Last week approximately fifty members of the Mayflower Society, from as far away as Florida and California, visited the Registry of Deeds. After



a brief tour of the Registry building, they were shown several original documents of significant historical interest from the Plymouth Colony Records. These documents included our first deed in the handwriting of Colonial Governor William Bradford, the will of Myles Standish and the 1623 vote of the Colonial Court which established the right to a trial by a jury for civil and criminal cases in America." The evening ended with a dinner and program at the Hotel 1620. It was a day enjoyed by all attendees.



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
