Outgoing Governor's Message

This will be my final report for the Quarterly, as Governor. As I turn over the gavel and Governorship of this great Society, I want to say thank you! Thank you to all of you who supported us these last two years. When we began in 2021, we were still in the throes of the "Covid Pandemic".

Who could have imagined after we rode that wave of the Rose Parade Float on January 1st, 2020 in Pasadena, that we'd be locked down for a couple years? As an aside, several of us Float Rider Alumni attended our Membership Meeting in Emeryville on June 17th - Former Governor General, George Garmany; DGG, Ray Raser; State Advisor, Marcia Maloney; Foothill Colony Governor, Carole Curran, and myself.

But in June 2021, many were still fearful about the future and what the "new normal" would look like. Now, in 2023, we are pretty much back to some sort of normal. The "new normal" is one where we are just more careful and aware. If someone starts coughing, we immediately take a few steps away. We let everyone know, "It's ok to not come over or attend meetings, if you're sick. Stay home and get well."

This last quarter, I attended the swearing in ceremo-

nies of the elections of a couple Southern California Colonies. First, I was invited by the *Inland Empire Colony* to swear in the new board of Pamela Mikkelsen. She took over the reins from former Governor,

Susan Christopher. We also heard a great presentation from Donna A. Watkins, the author of "Diverse Gashes: Governor William Bradford, Alice Bishop, and the Murder of Martha Clarke, Plymouth Colony 1648". What an interesting story about the murder of Martha Clark in 1648 and how Governor Bradford had to conduct the trial. Donna is also the author of "Weaker Vessels: The Women and Children of the Plymouth Colony."

I was then invited by the Santa Barbara Colony to present my video of the Bradford History, "An Accidental Find Leads to a Monumental Discovery – God's Providence in the Return of the Bradford Journal". It was well received. Then they had their election and I was honored to swear in the new board of the Colony. Jay Williams was elected the new Governor. What was unique about this was that half of the Colony met up on the Central Coast area and the other half in Santa Barbara, a couple hours south. You can see in the picture the whole board, with former Governor, now Colony Treasurer, Ray Garrett and the Board members of the northern end of the Colony on the Zoom call, behind Governor, Jay Williams, Marj Friestad and me.

At our Membership Meeting on June 17th, we had about 52 attendees in the room, at the Hilton Garden Inn, in Emeryville. There were also about 6 to 7 attendees via Zoom. We voted on several Bylaws updates and Standing Rules. Most notably, for our newest Members, they are now considered paid through the next year, if they have joined after July 1st. Also, we adjusted when a member is considered delinquent for paying annual dues.

For everyone, please make a special note, you must be paid by January 1st of each year, in order to not be delinquent. Dues collection season will begin in September and run through December 31st each year. The new date for being dropped from the California Mayflower Society is now January 31st. This is because we have to pay the GSMD dues for all active members by early February.

Former Governor General, Dr. George Garmany, honored us with his presence at all of the meetings on the 16th and 17th. At the Membership Meeting, he gave a very interesting presentation titled, "New England Captivities – Terrorism at the turn of the 18th Century." Whew! Those were rough days trying establish this country. But, having another country pay the native tribes to cause mayhem, added deeper complication to the already complicated relationships between the settlers and native tribes. (You'll have to hear the presentation to know which other country was sticking their fingers into things).

Now, I have turned over the reins of the California Mayflower Society to our new Governor, Kathy Watson. Since the beginning of my term in June 2021, we have accomplished so much for the California Mayflower Society. I wanted to remind you of a few things we did, which I believe will put us on a solid foundation for the future.

Right when we started, we received the results of the Audit Committee from the previous Administration. The results of the committee came with specific recommendations. Several of the key ones we started to work on right away:

- 1) First, with the help of our former Investment Chair, Former Governor General, Judy Swan, we developed a comprehensive Investment Policy. This was adopted in October 2021. This serves as a guide for us to manage our investments in a protected and wise manner, to provide us the monthly income for our Oakland Library and will help us support our Life Member Dues annually that we pay the GSMD.
- 2) We formed an Investment Committee, comprised of four appointed members, in staggered four-year terms. It has been led so magnificently by John McNeill, the Governor of the Redwood Empire Colony. Other members on the Committee are Lorraine Kocen, former Governor, now Elder of the Rancho Conejo Colony, Joseph Morehead, of the Mother Lode Colony, and the newest member, Milton Greenway, of the Inland Empire Colony. The State Treasurer, Harvey Soldan, sits on the committee as an ex officio member, representing the Executive Board. All are serving your Society so well. During these tumultuous times, they have worked with our Investment Manager to keep us protected, as much as possible, from the volatility. In October, Kathy will appoint those serving two-year terms currently, to four-year terms.
- 3) Next, we did something that seems so self-evident now, given our huge size we found a professional CPA firm to handle our Federal and State Taxes! This is crucial for us, because we need to remain compliant with all Federal IRS laws regarding our non-profit status. Having a professional company do it protects us and will keep us in line for the long term.
- 4) One of the tasks I delegated to, now former Deputy Governor North, Kathy Watson, was to help us create and launch a Bequest Program, we call "Leaving a Legacy". This was a project I had been thinking about for several years to help fund the organization. It is operational and we are already accepting bequests.

We are able to receive in-kind donations, as well as cash donations from estates. All funds will be applied to our many projects and enable us to do so much more to support our educational charter. If you would like to put the California Mayflower Society in your Estate Plan, please speak with your colony Governor or Kathy Watson to get the information. You can also get the information from the State website: https://www.camayflower.org/leave-a-legacy.html . When you do fill out the forms, you will become an honored "One Small Candle Legacy Member" of the California Mayflower Society and will receive a specially made pin to wear proudly in Colony and State meetings.

- 5) We are (almost) done with our new combined Society database, that is designed to streamline the process of managing all prospective and active members of the Society in one system. This will enable our Historian, Membership Secretary and Treasurer to work off of the same database. Image three different systems managing over 2600 members...it is so much wasted time trying to align three systems, not to mention the complication of having 14 Colonies using different systems. The goal is to have everyone, including the Colonies, manage their finances and members using the same database. Wouldn't that be so nice? Our Technology Chair, Richard Grogan, is busily working on it and it will soon be launched.
- 6) In 2023, we increased our State Scholarship amounts by \$500 each and added a 4th place winner. This year the 2024 fourth place \$1000 scholarship will be designated as the "David Grinnell Memorial Scholarship," since the Inland Empire Colony gave the State Scholarship Fund a generous \$1000 donation in David's name. He served our State Society and the Inland Empire Colony for years and will be greatly missed by us all.
- 7) There's so much more, from Bylaws updates to "going electronic" on our new member applications to Plymouth, a program really led and advocated for by Mandy Dunkle, our State Historian this has really streamlined and simplified the process for all of the Member Societies in the GSMD. Thanks Mandy!

Well, though there's so much more, I want to say "thank you" to my Appointed Board of Assistants members and my Executive Board, all of whom served the State Society so ably and with dedication this last term. First, I'll start with my Appointed Members of the BOA. I cannot put into words how much I've appreciated your being a part of my Administration. Here is the list of all of my Appointed BOA Members and Chairs: (I gave Certificates of Appreciation to each of them at our Membership Meeting in Emeryville on June 17th.)

Incoming Governor's Message

Pilgrim Brothers and Sisters: Greetings to all the members of the California Mayflower Society. Just two short weeks ago I was elected as your Governor. I am humbled yet overjoyed at this wonderful opportunity to lead a great team of Mayflower descendants. This Mayflower ship has sailed, and my hope is at the end of our journey we will look back having reached the right destination for our Society.

Let me introduce myself to you as your new Governor. You might have heard my name, Kathy Watson, associated with other lineage societies such as DAR, DAC, and Colonial Dames. My ancestor Ste-

phen Hopkins is a qualifying ancestor for Jamestowne Society AND Mayflower Society. My ancestor Mary Chilton, who married John Winslow, was proven in order to become a member of the Winslow Heritage Society AND a cousin to my husband Marston. At the membership meeting on June 17th, we had the special honor of having Former Governor General, George Garmany, representing GSMD attend our meetings and install the newly elected Executive Board.

As many of you could not attend the Membership Meeting in Emeryville, I wanted to share with you my thoughts upon being installed: My journey to standing before you today began by attending many Mayflower events and introducing myself as a Mayflower "wanna be". Genealogical searches for a Mayflower ancestor escaped me until meeting with Chris Childs of the New England Historical and Genealogical Society in 2012. I was seeking his expertise to submit more DAR supplemental patriots. I had selected a Vermont ancestor to

research. Chris uncovered Mayflower ancestry for my ancestor's wife leading to Stephen Hopkins.

I am so honored for your electing me to be Governor of the California Mayflower Society and present three goals for this administration: Maintain fiscal responsibility: the state society is financially sound to the credit of the past administration implementation of the audit recommendations. The investment committee functions well to support state society operations.

Encourage member involvement and retention. The membership secretary reported troubling numbers which can be ameliorated through the involvement of new members and reaching out to members who have not paid their dues. Introduce technology to make member management easier for the Treasurer and Membership Secretary.

I would like to thank Governor Scott Miller (now DGG) and the former Board for your dedication to this Society and for shepherding us through the last two years. You helped advance the society by establishing an investment committee integral to the continued financial stability of the Society. Another milestone established is the opportunity for any member to "leave a Legacy" by naming the society in your will.

There are some open positions for which I'm seeking to make appointments: OPEN: State Education Chair – who can work with State-level Education Organizations to open up doors to school curricula to tell the accurate history of the Pilgrims in a more formal way.

Bylaws and Policies & Procedures Manual – who would review and make recommendations to amend the bylaws (if necessary). Public Relations Committee: Chair is open; Mandy Dunkle & Marcia Maloney promote the Society on social media. Anyone who has an interest in the roles and committees just mentioned, please speak with your Colony Governor or reach out to anyone on the Executive Board to discuss the right fit for you.

Finally, many of us have registered to attend the General Society's 43rd Triennial where elections are held, and bylaw changes/financial decisions are enacted by the member societies. One financial proposal is for an application fee increase. While we have requested detailed supporting information none has been provided. In principle the California Society of Mayflower Descendants is not inclined to support this proposal. I am looking forward to attending and participating in the General Society Congress as your Governor.

This Spring, I attended three colony meetings: Los Angeles Colony on April 22, Foothill Colony on April 29, and Rancho Conejo Colony on May 6. Each was a nice gathering of fellow Mayflower Descendants interested in the early history of the colonies that would become the United States. More details for each would be in the section for the colonies elsewhere in this Quarterly

but I want to comment on the presentation of the Rancho Conejo Colony speaker, Dr. Michaela Reaves of California Lutheran College, "From Padres to Pearls: Spanish Influence on the Colonial Atlantic Seaboard". Most of us know about the early Spanish settlements in Florida, Mexico, and the current United States Southwest. But what was especially interesting to me in this talk was how far the Spanish explorers went inland and north through the current United States Southeast. Always nice to learn something new.

On May 27, I attended the Scottish Fest in Costa Mesa wearing my Pilgrim attire where the California Mayflower Society had a table. I worked the table in the afternoon talking to prospective members with some of those attendees seeming ready to apply based on having relatives who were members. Both the Costa Mesa and the Ventura Scottish events are fun celebrations with plenty of bagpipes.


On June 17, I attended the California Society Board of Assistants meeting held in Emeryville where the officers for the new two year term were elected. Former Governor General George Garmany gave a presentation titled "New England Captives – Terrorism at the turn of the 18th Century" discussing the captive of New England colonist living in the outlying towns by Native Americans.

He especially focused on the raid of Deerfield, MA in 1704 by a coalition of French soldiers and their Indian allies. Of the 291 people in the town on the night of the attack, forty-four were killed and 109 were taken captive with the intent to take them to Canada. When hearing about such events, I try to put myself in those times.

I have ancestors in the 1600's and early 1700's who were killed by Native Americans especially in Indian raids in King Phillip's War of 1675. But to be fair, I have ancestors who were part of raids on Indian settlements including the massacre at Mystic Fort on May 26, 1637, as part of the Pequot War. In the account of Capt. John Mason who led the raid on the Indian Fort and settlement, he mentions my ancestor, Nicholas Olmsted: "Lieutenant Thomas Bull and Nicholas Olmsted beholding, came up; and when it was thoroughly kindled, the Indians ran about as most dreadfully Amazed".

Nicholas was from Wethersfield, CT, where nine civilians were killed in an Indian raid on April 23 as part of the escalating back and forth. Nicholas would clearly have been affected by that as the Wethersfield population was less than 200 people. From the fire started by Nicholas and the killing of those attempting to flee the burning settlement, up to four hundred Pequot men, women, and children were killed. I visited the Pequot Museum in Mashantucket, CT, last Fall for their perspective. I am proud of all my ancestors and always recognize the struggles they went through establishing the colonies. But I want to also remember that they were people who may have done things for which I am not proud. I encourage us all to learn and remember history as accurately as possible.

It has been a goal of this Administration to bring members together, physically and spiritually. It is astonishing to me how many Elders I have spoken to had no idea what was expected of them other than offering prayers at meetings. Last year all Colony Elders were sent a list of their nonagenarian members, many responded with gratitude and promised to send birthday cards and to try to be in touch with those venerable members. As State Elder I continued to send cards to our burgeoning centenarian membership. I use Hallmark ecards which are personalized and sent by Hallmark. They are lovely and spare everyone my declining penmanship!

I hope the new administration continues and grows the "Wellness Check" program, I am happy to help in any way needed. In addition to bringing colonies closer together in various ways, it is a Blessing for those in need - whether out of loneliness, isolation, illness or bereavement – to receive a call or note from someone who cares.

From a practical point of view, keeping in touch with those on the fringes, especially long out-of-touch life members is incredibly helpful. When this administration came into office an effort to track "lost" members was undertaken. Dozens of deceased members were identified and reported, the State no longer paying dues for members who had passed, in some cases decades before.

It has been an honor and pleasure to serve in Governor Miller's administration,

We have accomplished so much in these two years and have processed record

numbers of new and supplemental applications. We've cleared out a massive backlog and have now streamlined the application process into a fully digital submission to the General Society. I want to thank my team of Assistant Historians for their help in this and for their support. Diane Douglass, Dianna Saario, Erica Hahn, and Ken Whittemore – you've been a great asset to our State Society. As we start a new administration, I feel a bit of housekeeping for how applications and supplementals are initiated would be helpful:

The preliminary form has changed in the last few years. Our current preliminary form is emailed to you directly. However, it is not mailed back to our Oakland office, but instead emailed to me at: historian@camayflower.org or you can email me for my address to send by postal mail. No funds are sent when you mail your preliminary form to me. Funds are only accepted when the application is completed and ready

to go to Plymouth for final approval.

The GSMD offers a "Mayflower Lineage Match" program for those interested in confirming a line they believe to be plausible. This costs \$75, however it is not required to do in order to become a member or to submit a supplemental; nor does the money spent for this service go towards your application fee. This is simply a service that the GSMD offers but is not a prerequisite to join. Our current fees are: New Applications - \$245 / Supplementals - \$185 / Silver Supplementals \$140 / and a family rate of \$215 for any family members applying along with you for the same line at the same time.

As always, if you have any questions, you may always email me at historian@camayflower.org. I'm here to help you with all your research and application questions! I will be attending the GBOA congress in Plymouth this September and we will be voting on a lot of important items as well as voting for a new board. I'm excited for what the future holds for the GSMD!

The Historian team has submitted approximately 50 new member applications and 35 supplementals since April 1st, 2023.

Since April 1st, 2023, 41 new applications and 38 supplementals were approved.

Letter to Ancestor December 1, 1621

To my dearest Uncle Robert,

It has been a little over a year since we landed on this new continent, and I have so much to share with you.

The journey was a test of faith. The Mayflower ship in which we travelled was small, cramped, and more than most of us could bear for 66 days. We took a northern ocean route to avoid pirates, but we did run into a bad storm and the beams that frame our ship were damaged. Thankfully, we had the tools aboard to fix it and we forged ahead. The trip was treacherous. We lived in the dark, cold cargo area and it was wretched. But we all new our suffering was temporary. And the grace of God blessed us with a successful voyage.

After arriving in November last year at a place called Cape Cod we sailed up the coast to Plymouth to build our town. The land is wooded and covered in brush. The native tribe, the Wampanoag, inhabited the land before us. However, most of them fell ill and passed before we arrived. I hope our passengers will continue to be friendly with them and keep the peace.

Sadly, we lost about half the people on the ship to sickness after we arrived. I also fell sick and wasn't sure if I would survive the harsh winter in my condition. We endured subfreezing temperatures, harsh winds, and heavy snow at times. I was taken back to my days as a sickly child when I was so weak. And sadly, my dear wife Dorothy passed away while we were anchored offshore. She accidentally drown in the icy waters after falling off the ship. My heart is broken and the grief overtakes me at times. I do worry how our son John will take the news of his mother's passing. It is so bitterly cold here and we weren't prepared.

By March this year, we had built homes for most everyone. However, before everyone moved off the ship, we drafted a document called *The Mayflower Compact* that 41 of the male passengers signed. I was tasked with writing it out on the manuscript. It is a document that proclaims our new government but also still shows our allegiance to the Crown of England. We all agree to follow the rules set forth in this compact as a tribute to our survival in this new land.

Six months into our time here, our elected Governor John Carver passed away. I was then chosen to take his place. There are so many challenges here and I am so weary after everything we have endured. I refuse to give up though and believe I can make a difference in this new land. Although the days are long with building and setting up our new town, I do find the time to read at night via candlelight. I was able to bring my beloved books with me and they have been my faithful companions. The words comfort me in my times of our doubt and uncertainty.

This last year has been at times tedious and dreadful but also joyous and blessed. Our cries to the Lord did not go unanswered. We are now on our way to building this Colony into what we had envisioned.

My Dearest Alden Family,

Life in the New Land has been full of new adventures. Of course, there have been challenges along the way, but that was to be expected. As we settled into unknown land and having only the tools that we brought from England, we had the task of building small homes to be more comfortable on this plantation. The main reason though, is to be out of the elements as the weather can be harsh. Many people still lived on the ship because the weather hindered conditions. We have planted corn under the guidance of the Indians, the native people or savages of this mew land.

Originally, we thought that there would be conformation with these people, but we both came to realize that peace is the best solution. They have helped us survive and adjust to this way of living off the land. These Indians are very minimalist. They do not wear clothing except for covering their lower pelvic area. They are free with their bodies and have no shame or embarrassment. Most of them are trusting and yet they have no religion or order of faith. We will occasionally feast with the Indians.

Although it sounds like life is grand in this new land, it is a constant work in progress. We have laws that generated and set expectations for crimes that may be committed and how they will be punished. For every person who sees an opportunity that is not legitimate, they need to understand that there will be consequences. As you know, there are some people who travelled to this new land, not for religious freedom, but for money or greed. This document, which is called the Mayflower Compact is very important over here in the new world because it has established laws as well as everyone working together to survive in this new world. I believe that it will be a valuable resource to the generations who come after us.

When I return to England with some of the furs from the animals that were skinned and other items from this new land, I do hope that I can have a good exchange of value for these items. This way I will be better stocked when I return again to the New England area. Looking forward to seeing you soon.



She has allowed me to court her throughout the summer and returned my affections as well! Soon I shall ask for her hand in marriage and pray for the Lord's blessing, as I eagerly am. Please find Mr. Mullins other two children and pass along the unfortunate and painful news of their father's death.

Thank you, dear Cousin, for providing me with the opportunity to come along on the May-flower to the New World. I cannot express my gratitude for my newfound love and appreciation of the adventure that I was keeping bottled up in England. I now see God has been using my time in England in order to hone my skill and profession for the good of this community.

I have been elected to serve as the governor's assistant and fully intend to remain fully involved in the politics of this budding colony. Though it was a long and perilous journey I have thrived, gratefully, and my hope is that the Lord will continue to use me and others in this New World so that we can follow his statutes as he originally intended.





Three of the More children died that first winter, but Richard survived. Marcia then asked members to share what they knew of their Mayflower children passenger ancestors, initiating some well-received stories. We often focus on the leaders of Plymouth and may not know that of the 102 passengers on the Mayflower, thirty of them were children. Imagining the more than thirteen weeks in that small ship with that many children, makes the journey even more remarkable. The Plymouth Colony was unique in this aspect of having families. Twenty-five children survived that first winter so nearly half the colony was under 18 years old that spring. Many lived long lives and greatly contributed to the future of the colony.


San Diego Colony

Mayflower Indexing: Preserving the Legacy

The General Society is developing an indexing platform to digitally capture 400 years of life events for every generation of Mayflower ancestors. This platform is in the final stages of development; testing with volunteer indexing begins soon. Members have volunteered to index the applications in their spare time.

This new platform replaces the current manual system with a fully digitized application and documentation system which will enhance access for Plymouth staff and member society historians. 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David Lawrence Grinnell

We are honoring our past state treasurer David Grinnell by sharing some of his life story with you. We appreciate the hours of work he has done on a volunteer basis over his years as our state treasurer and appreciate his willingness to keep working with us in other positions.

David Lawrence Grinnell was born in Newport, Rhode Island on September 17, 1943. He attended elementary school, junior high and senior high schools in Newport, graduating

from Rogers High School in 1962. After a sojourn in Washington, DC, David came back to Rhode Island to attend Bryant College in Providence, from which he graduated in 1968 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration. After working in public accounting for a few years, David decided to try his religious vocation, attending Holy Cross Monastery in West Park, New York for three years. Although that experience didn't develop into Life Vows, it did teach him important spiritual values which he tries to maintain to the present day.

After leaving the Monastery, David again returned to Rhode Island to pursue his career in accounting, working first for the City of Newport, and then for an inpatient drug and alcohol rehabilitation Center. In 1976, after several attempts to stop drinking on his own, David joined Alcoholics Anon-



ymous and began a totally new chapter in his life. After two years of sobriety, David married a girl he met in AA, Janice Louise Lauver. He and Jan were married for 15 years; they had a son, Nathan David Grinnell born in April 1980 and a daughter Jodi Michol Grinnell, born in February 1982. Today, David is the proud grandfather of two wonderful, spirit-filled children, Ryder Holmes Grinnell and Lila Collins Grinnell. David's son and his wife and the two grandchildren live in Georgia; David's daughter, recently married, lives in Santa Fe, New Mexico. In 1993, David and Jan were divorced; through the steps in AA, they realized that they were living a lifestyle that was contrary to what their Higher Power had intended. David began yet another chapter in his life. During the summer of 2002, David met a man at a Men's Retreat and after months of traveling back and forth between Rhode Island and Buffalo, New York, they decided to make a commitment to each other. In September 2008, they were legally married in Indio, California and in October 2009 they moved from Rhode Island to Palm Springs, California. David immediately became involved with a local Sons of the American Revolution Chapter and with the Inland Empire Colony, California Society of Mayflower Descendants.
